## Program Overview

It is Envision's belief that when families are given support, education, and resources, they are able to recognize and build on their strengths. The emphasis is on maintaining the family unit by providing supportive services that strengthen the entire family. Services are intended to be time-limited and outcome focused.

This program supports the healthy development of families and children so they may achieve their full potential.

The Diversion Program is free of charge. Referrals to this program come directly from the family seeking support, and other human service agencies or community based services.

**In 2023, our Family Support Team provided 240 transports for counselling and medical appointments.**

## Strength-Based Supports

All families can understand and relate to the stress that is involved with raising children. This program is designed to assist with these common family struggles. One-on-one support is provided in the client's home in a respectful, non-threatening manner during traditional and non-traditional office hours.



## The role of the Family Support Worker is...

To assist families in identifying their strengths, stresses, skills, and risk areas. These areas may include parenting skills, household management, or organizational and daily living skills.

## The role of the family is...

To maintain a positive working relationship with their Family Support Worker and agencies helping them meet their goals. This can be achieved through open communication, respect, and meeting on a regular basis. Goals are set with the family and reviewed every three months.



## Families Will Learn

- Age appropriate expectations
- Understanding of child development
- Parenting support
- Appropriate discipline techniques
- Knowledge around budgeting
- Increased household tasks and organizational skills
- Connection to community supports
- Improved communication skills
- Consistent routine and structure in the home
- Self-care strategies
- Healthy relationship awareness
